MISSION

BACKGROUND

Hispanics have been coming to Roseville since the 1920's and 30's working in the fields of agricultural and railroads. In the 1940's, many Latinos served in the Korean War and in World War I & II. In the 1950's many Latinos began graduating from Roseville High. In 1966, the Mexican American Scholarship Association was formed raising funds for youth to go to college. In 2000, the committee renamed itself H.E.A.R.
